Agwu's interests include gender studies, ethnomathematics, and the history of mathematics, especially the math of Ndebele dolls, African textiles, and the use of women's storytelling in STEM education. She has published two papers on Black mathematicians. She was awarded a Carnegie Africa Diaspora Fellowship (2014).
